Best quality: Versatility. She's a chameleon when it comes to activities and style.


Worst quality: "I'm overly enthusiastic. I want to do too much."

Worst quality: "I'm too easygoing. I trust too easily, and that can get me in trouble."


**Greatest accomplishment:** D'Arleans is proudest of a mural she painted in 2001. Entitled



The perfect date: Going to the spa at the Four Seasons Olympic Hotel for a massage, and then dinner at Marco's Supperclub.


Best quality: "I'm nurturing."


Worst quality: "I'm impatient and overly meticulous. I drive myself nuts."

Best place to meet people in Seattle: He says Sun Valley, but his favorite local hangout is Cactus in Madison Park.


What's your best quality? "Integrity. And I score high on flexibility." Worst quality? "Intensity. I'm too focused and serious sometimes."

Best place to meet people in Seattle: The Wild Rose on Pike Street, or Seattle Storm basketball games.


Best quality: Generosity, though her friend Cheryl Slean would say ambition. "She has an amazing amount of energy for getting things done," says Slean.


Worst quality: "Whining," admits Villegas. "Though I'm working on it."
